SUBJECT: PROPOSAL TO VARY THE BOROUGH OF BLACKBURN WITH DARWEN (SCHOOL ENTRANCE CLEARWAY) ORDER 2018

1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

To inform the Executive Member for Regeneration of the proposal to vary a Traffic Regulation Order as detailed below and seek approval to make it:-

NO STOPPING ON ENTRANCE MARKINGS MON-FRI 8AM-5PM East Park Road, Feilden Street and Paradise Lane

NO STOPPING ON ENTRANCE MARKINGS MON-FRI 8AM-5PM Dukes Brow, Prince's Street and West Park Road

2. RECOMMENDATIONS

That the Executive Member:

Authorise the Director of HR, Legal & Governance to advertise the proposed variation to a Traffic Regulation Order as per the attached schedule and make the order should no objections be made.

3. BACKGROUND

As part of a safety scheme in the vicinity of Queen Elizabeth Grammar School, it is proposed to introduce extended school keep clear restrictions on West Park Road, East Park Road and Dukes Brow. In addition to the above, this proposal includes minor modifications to existing school keep clears around St Anne's School and revocations of redundant orders in the vicinity of St Peter's School Mill Hill.

4. KEY ISSUES & RISKS

No risks arising from this proposal have been identified. The proposal is of benefit to the social and economic well being of the Borough.

5. POLICY IMPLICATIONS

The proposal to make and revoke and vary Traffic Regulation Orders requires delegated approval from the Executive Member for Regeneration and Chief Officer. Traffic Regulation Orders are required to be published in the local press and on site to comply with the Road Traffic Regulations Act 1984. Directly affected properties are consulted in line with current procedure.



SUBJECT: Proposal for a Digital Health & Care Hub in Blackburn Central Library

1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

To inform the Executive members for Resources, Health, Adult Social Care and Leisure, Culture and Young People of the proposal to create a digital health and care hub in Blackburn Central Library as detailed in this paper.

2. RECOMMENDATIONS

That the Executive Member:

Authorises the Director of Digital & Business Change to sign a memorandum of understanding with the Good Things Foundation to receive agreed funding and to begin implementation of the new hub working with Public Health and Library Services.

3. BACKGROUND

Increasingly people are self-managing long term health, care, wellness and long term complex needs using online tools and mobile apps. The new, joint Pennine Lancashire health and care plan 'Together a healthier future' aims to give people greater control over their health and care using digital tools. People can already book online GP appointments, repeat medications and view GP records online or through an app or websites in Blackburn with Darwen. As the technology improves across public services, people will in future be able to view their own detailed care plans and interact with NHS and care services through new digital channels, with an aim of improving lives and experiences.

The proposed digital health hub aims to help the people who need this technology the most to embrace the opportunities offered. The hub will provide coaching, education and showcase digital devices and apps to help local people learn and use these new tools to manage their health and wellness. We are working on this with partners across different sectors of care including the NHS.

After an expression of interest was submitted, the council are one of 5 areas nationally to receive an offer of £25,000 to implement the hub by NHS Digital and The Good Things Foundation to promote digital inclusion. We will co-design the first hub with local people who use it, starting small and developing the offer throughout the year (2019/2020).

The digital health hub will utilise the 'Curve' breakout space in the library which currently houses vending machines and some soft seating. The plans are to relocate the vending machines and increase the seating available in the space as well as introducing some child friendly seating. Library services will manage the implementation working with wellbeing services.

4. KEY ISSUES & RISKS

There are no identified risks with this scheme. The new health hub will reduce the risk of people being unable to embrace new digital tools to manage their health and improve outcomes. There will be additional seating available for people already using the Curve space in the library.

5. POLICY IMPLICATIONS

No known policy implications.

6. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The implementation of the digital health hub will be fully funded by £25,000 of grant funding from The Good Things Foundation after a successful council expression of interest. The funding will be transferred to the council in three phases throughout 2019/2020.

Legal services will advise upon the terms of the Memorandum of Understanding.

The digital health hub will utilise existing resources across the local health and care system, including existing wellbeing staff and library services. No additional resources are being sought.
